




Swindon Village Primary School Prospectus 2024-2025

Right from the beginning of their time with us, our pupils are valued and their independence promoted. Each of them is unique and we learn so much from their diverse experiences.

Transition from early year settings into Reception and onto Year 1 is smooth thanks to a planned schedule of visits and carefully designed induction process. Key members of staff work with the children to ensure they feel happy and safe to move onto the next stage of their education.

Our child-centred approach uses practical real-life learning opportunities, so that from a very early age, they are learning problem solving and explorative skills, often through projects that stem from their own interests.

...Your child comes FIRST

We pride ourselves in putting children first. We make sure they all progress well, feel safe and are happy in school.

OfSTED says that at Swindon Village, 'Pupils behave well, have very positive attitudes and attend school regularly.' This is a testament to our strong support systems which ensure pupils feel secure and confident at school. We work hard to remove barriers to learning and have strong inclusion procedures which make sure we meet the needs of all pupils.



Admissions

Children may start school from the beginning of the school year in which their fifth birthday falls. All applications are handled directly by the Local Authority.

Parents of children who have registered an interest in joining our school are invited to an introductory meeting with the Head Teacher and Foundation Stage staff during Term 2 (November/ December) of the previous year.

Once places are allocated, arrangements are made, in association with playgroups and other pre-school settings, for the children to visit the school in small groups. In June/July, our Foundation Stage teachers visit every child in their playgroup/nursery/home etc...

Initially, children attend on a part-time basis but are, normally, all in full-time by week 3 or 4.

Parents moving into the area, or considering sending their children to the school, are, in the first instance, invited to contact the Head Teacher to arrange a visit.

When applications for admission exceed the number of places available, the following criteria will be applied, in the order set out below, to decide which children to admit:

- 1. Children in Public Care (Looked After Children);
- 2. Children who have a sibling attending the school and who will continue to do so when the younger child is admitted;
- 3. Children with the strongest geographical claim, measured in a straight line from the ordnance survey address point of the child's home address (including flats) to the ordnance survey address point of the school, using the Local Authority's computerised measuring system, with those living closer to the school receiving the higher priority.

Special Educational Needs (SEN)

We are committed to addressing the individual needs of all our children to ensure that they reach their full potential. Children who are identified as having special educational needs are given our full support to minimise or overcome any barriers

to learning. All children are continually monitored to ensure that teaching and learning matches individual needs. Children are supported in a variety of ways using resources from within our school and through partnerships with outside agencies.

In all these situations, it is vital that strong links are maintained with parents and they are given regular opportunities to discuss their child's progress with the class teacher and the school's Inclusion Manager, Mrs. S. O'Leary.

Quality and Equality of opportunity for all

At Swindon Village Primary School, we are committed to working for quality and equality of opportunity for all our pupils. We aim to ensure that all students have opportunities to develop specific skills or talents.

We recognise that some of our children may have academic abilities or specific talents which range well beyond the average. A wide range of strategies are employed to ensure all children have the chance to excel.

Educational Visits

The children are often taken on educational visits to enhance and enrich the curriculum. For many visits, parents will be asked to make a voluntary contribution to cover the cost of transport and/or admission. Pupils in Years 4 and 6 go on a residential visit. Year 4 spend two nights at The Dean Field Study Centre in the Forest of Dean and Year 6 children enjoy five days away in Pembrokeshire, Wales.



School Uniform

The school has a proud tradition of school uniform and we are most grateful for the continued support of parents. We believe that wearing school uniform ensures that the children are smart and gives them a sense of identity. It also makes life easier for parents. The school colours are red and white.

In the Summer, Girls may wear red and white checked dresses with white socks.

Flat, black closed-toe shoes are our preferred footwear. Trainers are unsuitable for wearing all day in school. We would prefer that parents don't send their children to school in open toed sandals.

P.E. and house polo shirts, sweatshirts and cardigans, Black shorts, are all available from the school office.



Absences

Good attendance and punctuality are important. Parents are requested to avoid keeping their children away from school for appointments that could otherwise be arranged for after school hours or holidays. Parents wishing their children to leave school early for a particular reason must send a written request to the class teacher.

Parents are asked to telephone school as early as possible on the first day of their child's absence. For longer periods of absence it is important to notify the school of the on-going cause and the likely date of return of your child. If the school has heard nothing regarding a child's absence the office will telephone home to check once the class register has been taken.

Holiday absence during term time is strongly discouraged as it disrupts children's learning. In exceptional circumstances, schools may agree up to 10 days leave in an academic year. Requests must be made in writing to the Head Teacher.

Breakfast/After School Club/Drop Go

An independent Breakfast and After School Club is runs on the school site. This provides care for children between 7.30am and 6.00pm. Details are available from the school. We are currently running a Drop & Go system at 8:30am.

Break Time Snacks

Fruit or vegetables may be brought for eating at playtime. Free fruit or vegetables are available in school for all children in the Foundation Stage and Key Stage One.

Water

Children are encouraged to bring water, in non-spill bottles for drinking in school. Water dispensers are available for the children to refill their bottles. In addition to this there are drinking fountains in both play-grounds.

School Meals and Milk

Children can either have a packed lunch or a cooked lunch. All lunches are eaten in the hall during which time the children are supervised by our team of midday supervisors.

Hot meals are cooked onsite by abm. The menu is published in advance and children may have a school meal on whatever day their parents wish.

For children having sandwiches, packed lunches should be brought in a named container with non-fizzy drinks in an unbreakable container. Sweets and chocolate bars should not be included. We support parents in providing their children with a balanced lunchbox.

Semi-skimmed milk is available for children to drink at morning break time. Milk is free for children under the age of five and can be purchased for older children. Details are available from the school office.

Free meals and milk are available for those who qualify for certain benefits – further information and application forms are available from the office.



Homework

At Swindon Village Primary School, we recognise the vital role that parents play in their children's learning. We strongly believe in the value of the home-school partnership of which our Homework Policy is an important element.

However, it is important that Homework does not become a source of confrontation or friction between parents and children. Homework is most successful when parents take a genuine interest, are supportive and organise the home environment so that effective home learning can take place.

At Swindon Village Primary School, we believe in providing a balance between the development of basic skills, the importance of children developing as well-rounded individuals and have designed our Homework Policy to reflect this.

Whilst Homework is important, we believe that, at the primary school age, it should not be at the detriment of other activities that children may wish to participate in; such as Brownies, Cubs, sports activities and independent play.

Collective Worship

At Swindon Village Primary School we provide a daily act of worship in the form of an assembly. This may take place as a whole school, in classes, phases or houses. Within assemblies, there are opportunities for children to experience, appreciate and understand other world religions. Assemblies are broadly Christian based and focus on moral values and beliefs. Assemblies play an important role in fostering the school ethos, citizenship, good behaviour and a positive atmosphere.

Extra-Curricular Activities

Numerous activities take place depending on the time of year. Staff and parents voluntarily run a variety of activities which include:

We are grateful to all members of staff who run a club as we see it as a vital aspect of the school. Clubs enrich the curriculum and give children a further chance to extend and develop their talents. A timetable is sent home each term and children interested in a club return forms to the office.



Transfer to Secondary School




At the end of Year 6, pupils transfer to a range of secondary schools in the area including Cleeve School, Pittville School, All Saints' Academy and Winchcombe School.

Children may sit the admission tests for Pate's Grammar School and/or for the Gloucester Grammar Schools.

Visits are arranged during Term 6 to allow the children to familiarise themselves with their new school. Strong partnerships exist between our school and the various secondary schools and these assist our children with their transition.

We organise Information Evenings with each of the Secondary Head Teachers and our staff are happy to discuss the various secondary school options and address any concerns that parents may have.
